Mudlarking: Treasure Hunting in the Gorge!

Who among us hasn't spent a few curious moments along the waterline in the Gorge at low tide, poking at the muddy shore, examining a bit of colourful ceramic, an odd stone or an old bottle?

By some this is called "mudlarking." And Gorge-Tillicum local Bruce Campbell is perhaps one of Canada's most famous mudlarkers — although he prefers the term metal detectorist — and Bruce is a prolific discoverer of local treasure and history!

Some folks may recall that Bruce made national headlines, and even international news, in early 2014 when he discovered a 435-year-old silver coin in the waters off Curtis Point in Gorge Park. The coin, an extremely rare Edward VI shilling, minted in London in the early 1550s, had historians and conspiracy theorists once again debating claims that Sir Francis Drake may have traveled to the Pacific Northwest from California during his 1579 world expedition, 200 years before Capt. James Cook. (Some believe this happened in secret but that Queen Elizabeth I had it covered up, wishing to avoid territorial confrontation with Spain at the time.) Theories of global colonization aside, this was a very rare find, one which left many others in this game full of envy.

A calm and cheerful fellow, Bruce describes his hobby as "the patient search for things that have been lost while accepting that you will also find the things people throw away."

And boy, has his patience paid off! Bruce has a HUGE collection of neat stuff! Along with many other old and rare coins, Bruce has amassed interesting collections of various wonders - many of them, but not all of them, found in the Gorge - and each find comes with its own mystery. There are swim-house tokens, ornate military brass buttons, pocket knives, key rings, bullet shells, bells, antique spark plugs, brass lanterns, razors, collectable toys, metal figurines, cap guns - he once found a real gun, which he turned in to the police! - gold and silver jewelry, fishing lures, oar locks, unique cutlery, hat-pins, pocket-watch fobs, collectable bottles and engraved lockets, to name only some!

An array of treasures pulled from the Gorge

Many of the pieces Bruce has found along the Gorge confirm our known history. For example, the silver longhandled cocktail spoons he's found in Esquimalt Gorge Park, near where the Tea Gardens were, are not a surprise. An old brass razor or an ivory-handled toothbrush speak to the historical camping spots along the Gorge. But most interesting to me were a pile of unfired 19th century (1870s/80s) Kynoch 44 caliber pistol rounds he found on the banks of Gorge Park, near where 'The Free' Swim-house once stood. Evidence, perhaps, of an old, and last, 'Indian Battle' that was


rumored to have taken place between warring tribes along that part of the Gorge.

But beyond all this, Bruce takes the time to remove and recycle quite a bit of garbage and glass - all that he finds, in fact. And any lead he finds is melted down into a mold to make 12lb downrigger balls, or fishing weights, which he sells.

Bruce tells me he might be convinced to share more of his mysteries at our AGM in the spring!

a few words from the president

As president of the Gorge Tillicum Community Association, I am a very lucky guy. I get to work with amazing folks that reflect the diversity of our community. Many of you may not be aware, but besides the 12 members of the GTCA Board we have individual committees for transportation, land use, community garden, community tables (Lights on the Gorge) and, of course, the granddaddy of them all, the Gorge Canada Day Picnic committee. Each one of these has members from the neighbourhood who are specifically interested in contributing their voices and time to the community.

While these committees have ongoing work and projects, there are many other tasks in which we have particular interest. One such task is the planning for the McKenzie interchange. This project will have significant impacts on our community, so we have formed a

task group that includes engineers, planners and other concerned neighbours to make sure the planning includes input from the GTCA. Of course our first concern is about how traffic will be managed during construction, which may take up to two years.

We have also been invited to join the Uptown Douglas Street Corridor advisory group and will be participating in that process, as well as helping with the BC Housing Development plan for the Nigel Valley across from Gateway Village.

A couple of rather urgent concerns have arisen lately: campers in our parks, particularly Cuthbert Holmes and Gorge Parks, and now derelict boats on the Gorge Waterway that are moving up from Banfield Park to Curtis Point at Gorge Park.

Thankfully we have folks like Dorothy Chambers, Julian Anderson and Scott Karpes, who have worked to keep Saanich staff and police informed. We are also working with the politicians in Saanich and across our borders to find solutions to these issues.

The work of your community association never stops, and if you can spare any time, I am sure we can find a place where your assistance will be appreciated. As usual, I encourage you to contact us anytime if you have any questions or observations about what is going on in Gorge-Tillicum. I am always happy take part in conversations about our community. Derelict Boat in the Gorge

Some time in the second week of October, in the dark of night, a partially sunken trimaran arrived at Gorge Park. Witnesses reported seeing a powerboat with bright spotlights towing it up the Gorge to Curtis Point, where it was apparently tied to an existing buoy about 20 metres from shore. It was a startling sight. Mast down, decks strewn, covered with buckets, bike parts, tarps and other debris, it looked quite literally like a floating garbage dump. No one was living on the boat or indeed looking after it.

On Saturday, October 10, a storm came from the south and blew the decks clean, pushing most of these items into the waterway, and at high tide the boat itself was pushed up onto the muddy shore next to the point.

I need to mention that we, the GTCA, sent a letter to Saanich mayor and council three weeks prior to this boat's



arrival, asking that we prepare for a potential exodus of boats as the city of Victoria sought to expel "live aboards" from the Banfield Park area of the Gorge. (The city's legal plans were widely reported in local media in September.) We received almost no response.

On Sunday, October 18, after two weeks of worry and dozens of emails and news stories, the owner finally arrived to deal with the situation. George, the boat's owner, has claimed that someone else moved the boat here while he was away, and he promised to do his best to move it ASAP. At the time of our print deadline, the boat is still there, stuck in the mud, and Saanich is now scrambling to find solutions to what could become a serious problem in times to come.

The daycare will provide culturally respectful and much needed childcare for up to 70 children aged infant to five years. The name XaXe SŦELIŢĶEL-comes directly from the local SENĆOŦEN language of the Saanich People and translates to mean Sacred and Precious, which speaks to the integral Indigenous value of children.

It has long been the hope and vision of the Centre to build its own

childcare setting of excellence, to provide a safe, affordable, culturally diverse and respectful setting where children and families will benefit in many ways.

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Good Neighbours: Parking By The Book

Many residents in the Gorge Tillicum area have expressed concern regarding the increasing number of vehicles being parked on the streets. Following is a summary of how Saanich regulates overall vehicle parking within the municipality.

Why do we have bylaws?

The Saanich bylaws set a minimum standard for our neighbourhoods and aim to ensure that all Saanich residents live in safe, clean and healthy communities.

What restrictions on vehicle parking exist?

To keep our streets and neighbourhoods safe, the Streets & Traffic Regulation Bylaw prohibits parking of any vehicle:

- On or over a sidewalk or boulevard.
- In front of or within 1.5 m of each side of a driveway entrance abutting a street.
- Within 5 m of a fire hydrant.
- Within 6 m upon the approach to stop sign or traffic control signal.
- On or over a bicycle lane.
- On the left side of a street.

Are unlicensed vehicles allowed to be parked anywhere?

In order to park on a street, your vehicle must have current registration and be licensed, insured, operable and properly equipped. An unlicensed vehicle is not allowed to be parked on any street or boulevard.

Do any restrictions on vehicle parking on a street overnight exist?

Parking of a vehicle weighing more than 4000 kg or longer than 7 m is not allowed overnight on any street.

Is trailer (e.g., a utility trailer, recreational vehicle or boat) parking prohibited anywhere?

No trailer can be left on a street if not connected to a vehicle. No trailer can be parked upon any boulevard or grass in any street in Saanich.

What is meant by boulevard?

Boulevard means the portion of any roadway right-ofway other than the paved, improved or main travelled roadway, driveway or sidewalk. It includes the grassy or landscaped median in front of residents' houses, between the private property line and paved roadway.

Are any vehicles allowed to be parked upon boulevards?

No vehicle (including a utility trailer, recreational vehicle or boat) is allowed to be driven or parked upon any boulevard or grass in any street in Saanich.

What are the parking requirements for a legal Secondary Suite?

One additional on-site parking space for the occupant of the secondary suite must be provided on the private property. Tandem parking on the driveway is permitted.

How else are we responsible for our streets?

Property owners/occupants are generally responsible for their property and the adjacent boulevards and sidewalks. It is their responsibility to clear and remove snow and ice from municipal sidewalks in front of their property. Complete removal of snow and ice means down to the bare pavement. If snow is not removed it makes walking difficult and dangerous for neighbours, particularly the elderly. Failure to do so can result in the property owner/occupant receiving a fine(s).

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Colquitz/Sooke Watershed Protection Act

Recently in our neighbourhood, Karen Devitt, Program Coordinator for Bird Studies Canada, based in Delta, put on a workshop to talk about ways communities can get involved in bird conservation and a new project about Coastal Waterbird Disturbance.

BC's coastline provides
important wintering habitat
for birds and also falls within
the Pacific Flyway – a major
route for migratory birds that
extends from Alaska and the
Canadian North all the way
down to South America.

Millions of birds rely on BC's coasts to rest, feed and nest. Many of the areas that are important for coastal birds are also popular for human recreational activities. The mud-flat, narrow estuaries of the Colquitz River, Craigflower Creek, Gorge and Cecelia creeks and the shores of Portage Inlet are very important feeding areas for shorebirds that are being disturbed by motorized and non-motorized boaters, canoes, kayaks, and paddle boarders coming in close proximity to them.

Recreational activities can disturb waterbirds while they nest, rest and fuel up for migration. Disturbance to waterbirds from recreational activities can negatively impact birds by displacing birds from preferred habitats, disrupting important foraging and breeding behaviour, and increasing energy expenditure when birds should be resting. This area, being a Federal Migratory Bird Sanctuary, is particularly impacted.

Preventing disturbance to coastal waterbirds is important to reduce negative impacts on bird populations.



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Top Shelf Bookkeeping

Brian Ritchie, founder and owner of Top Shelf Bookkeeping, doesn't look like your average businessman. Bearded, and dressed in a black short-sleeved shirt and rumpled blue denim shorts, he looks like he'd be more comfortable at a music festival than behind a ledger. Later I discover that the look is deliberate. Reflecting the firm's slogan, "Casual People, Professional Results," Top Shelf's success is built on providing a friendly environment for people who might initially be nervous about coming into an office to discuss their financial affairs.

The origins of this orientation come from Brian's history in the Gorge-Tillicum area. Coming to British Columbia in 1988 to establish a firmer connection with his birth and adoptive parents, Brian found work doing accounts for an agricultural operation involved in the growing and selling of flowers. In 1989 he moved to Obed Avenue and established an accounting business in his house for neighbours and clients he had met while working for the agricultural firm. Many of these were new Canadians who were nervous about the whole business of tax and accounts and felt more comfortable discussing these in a family house than in a downtown high-rise office.

His business eventually became far too big for his house, and in 2007 he moved to the office we are meeting in, on Gorge Road West between Qu'Appelle and Wascana streets. Outgrowing this office almost as soon as he moved into it, he opened a second

office in Esquimalt a couple of years later.

Presently the firm employs seven people full time in the two wings of the business: bookkeeping (filing GST and PST returns, payroll, electronic deposits, ledger keeping, looking after receivable and payable items) and tax preparation (including personal, corporate, charitable, and trust accounts).

Brian's philosophy is to hire people who find accounting as much fun as he does, with the result that most of the people he has hired are still with him.

He regards coming to Gorge-Tillicum as a "happy accident." He was drawn by the parks, green space and water but particularly values watching the children of his neighbours grow up and have children of their own, some of whom have become his clients too. Everything about the area works for him, except for the speed of the traffic on the section of Gorge Road West outside his office, the way the cars and trucks race down the hill from the lights at Harriet Road.

Just as I'm concluding the interview, a voice comes from the waiting room behind me. "Brian gets lots of

referrals; did he tell you that?" The voice belongs to a smartly dressed young Indo-Canadian man who had obviously been listening carefully to the later part of our interview. When I ask him to explain, he says that his father knew Brian at the flower farm where both worked. "And now I live in Alberta, but I still come here, just like my dad. Top Shelf is the best." I look at Brian enquiringly. "I'm grateful to the South Asian community for helping me get my business off the ground; they've been some of my biggest supporters," he says. The young man opens the door for me, and I head off for home, full of appreciation for a firm that seems to have combined success, inclusion and love of neighbourhood in a most impressive fashion.

Low-Impact Ice Skating: Great for Everyone's Health

Ice skating is a great form of exercise. It is easy on your joints because it is low impact, and it improves your balance and coordination. You use a lot of small stabilizer muscles that don't get a workout in day-to-day life, in particular those around your hips, knees and ankles. You are also toning larger muscles in your legs, butt and core as you propel yourself on the ice.

Ice skating is an aerobic exercise that aids in weight loss. Recreational ice skating burns between 250 and 810 calories per hour. Competitive ice skating burns even more calories, approximately 450 to 1080 per hour. You will build muscle tone if you ice skate regularly. By building muscle, you get the added benefit of increasing your metabolic rate, meaning you will lose more weight, even while asleep.

You will also increase your endurance if you ice skate regularly. Over time you will notice that you are able to maintain a constant steady pace. This endurance will spread to other parts of your life, and you may notice that you have more energy to complete tasks that used to fatigue you.
