he tentative opening date is September 21st, but construction schedules and changes have delayed the project before, so we keep our fingers crossed.

The new 14,000 square feet library is the newest addition to the Greater Victoria Public Library system, and it will include fiction and non-fiction material and magazines; DVD rentals; an information commons area for computer use; a group study area; children and teen sections; a learning centre; a lounge; and quick book drops. A dedicated teen librarian will be based at the new branch, but this staff member will service all of the GVPL system.

The Saanich Archives will also be accommodated in approximately 1,400 square feet of the library. The archive space will include a climate-controlled vault to protect Saanich archival material, and it might also include some of the GVPL rare book collection.

The Gorge Tillicum Community Association applied for, and was pleased to receive, a Saanich Community Matching Grant to purchase new library furniture for the children's section, as this was not accounted for in the overall library budget.

Separate additions to Pearkes now house Saanich Neighbourhood Place and will include a new activity space, kitchen, meeting room, clothing exchange, toy storage, and an outside play area. The new teen activity room is already open.

This new library, now ten years in the planning, will be a valuable addition to the GVPL system and, of course, the Gorge / Tillicum community. GVPL data shows that library card usage was lower here than in most communities, and this is likely because access to library services has been a problem for many local residents. We can't tell you how excited we are that this is about to change!



he Victoria Amateur Swim Club (VASC) -- one of six aquatic associations active on the waterway in the 1920s -- was located along Gorge Road West from 1919 to 1925. The club's rustic facilities included a floating clubhouse, equipped with a pot-bellied stove, and a water polo "tank" fenced with chicken wire. A rectangular swimming enclosure, formed with logs and boarding and built to a regulation-length of 50 yards, allowed the club to host local, provincial, and national open-water championships.

Official swimming competition wasn't the club's only concern; working on water safety skills and simply allowing people to have fun were equally important. Kids would turn up at the club facilities on summer mornings with bag lunches, and they would while away the day swimming and baking carefree in the sun. Adults arrived after work, bringing along picnic suppers of watermelon, banana sandwiches, cake, and tea.

So many club members turned up on sunny weekends that residents along nearby Gorge Road complained to Saanich council about the unseemly laughter emanating from the swimming site on Sunday afternoons. Some councillors responded with wishes that they were young enough to enjoy the fun.

But the sport did not end with winter; the group also established the first annual Christmas Day swim in 1919. While onlookers, dressed warmly in heavy woolen coats and caps, watched from the wooden decks, brave swimmers plunged in and swam the full 50 yards! The cold winter of 1922 was particularly challenging as the pool had to be cleared of ice before the swim. Remarkably, some of those swimmers went ice-skating on frozen Portage Inlet later that same day.

In June 1925, the VASC moved to the newly-opened Crystal Garden pool where they hosted a grand swimming gala that featured Johnny Weissmuller as guest athlete. The club president on that occasion was former Canadian swimming champion Jock McNeill of Albina Street. The distant house at the top of this photo stands today at 2837 Inez Drive.

Mr. Lai has assured us that this project is still one of their priorities.

Speaking of the picnic, yes, we know we need more food vendors and, yes, this will be taken care of next year.

There have been the inevitable delays, mainly due to the acceleration of the plans to replace the Colquitz- Admirals bridge. Then there is the matter of having work crews available to actually do the work. Saanich will be letting us know later this month precisely what work will be completed this year and what is to be deferred to next year. When we know, we will pass it on.

Celebrating 25 Years in the Community

Tillicum Centre was named after a small sailing ship, the "Tilikum," which sailed in the early 1900s. The boat was originally a dug-out canoe purchased from an aboriginal on Vancouver Island by Captain John Voss who modified it prior to embarking on his voyage. He sailed it for three years, three months, and twelve days, taking it over three oceans from Victoria to England. For our anniversary celebration, our partner, the BC Maritime Museum, will display the "Trekka" at Tillicum Centre. This is a slightly smaller but equally famous sailing ship, and it will to be on display at from mid-September to October 13th.

Our celebrations kick into full swing on October 6 & 7 with a weekend of heritage dance demonstrations. This will be followed by three days (October 10, 11, & 12) of Maritime Museum educational presentations of "Hartack and Marlinspikes: Life and Work Aboard Ship." The Grand Finale takes place on October 13th with the ever-popular Pirate School, musical entertainment, a small ceremony, and free cake and coffee for all.

LOCAL HEROGeorge Ball

didn't know George Ball, but I wish I had. George arrived in the Gorge area in 1920 as a 10 year old, and he lived in the neighbourhood for over 80

During those years, he married his wife, Rose; built a house on Maddock Avenue; raised two daughters, Marilyn and Joan; and followed his father into 'Ball Electric' which later became 'Ball and Shemilt'. The business -- a neighbourhood landmark for many years -- operated on the north west corner of Burnside and Harriet and evolved from automotive electrics to radio and television sales and repair.


George and Rose (who also worked in the store) retired in the late 1960s, but George stayed very active with another passion: astronomy. He was an honorary president of the Victoria Centre of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada, and he built a classic domed observatory in his own backyard, complete with computer for calculations and his own telescope and cameras to view and photograph the northern night skies.

As if that wasn't enough to keep him busy, George was also a keen gardener, an avid reader, and a trombone player.

He also built a family cabin on property at Prospect Lake, and he gained fame for being the first person in Victoria to successfully get TV reception from Seattle on his home built receiver.

Friends describe George as polite, humorous, practical, honest, and unassuming. After having lived a rich, full, productive life, most of it based right here in Gorge Tillicum, George Ball passed away in January 2007. Maybe you knew George Ball; I wish I had.



Compost for our Climate and Community

There a is lot of talk in the news lately of climate change, but did you know that composting can reduce its impacts?

omposting your food and yard waste means that fewer trucks go to the landfill and therefore less carbon dioxide is released in the exhaust. It also means less methane is released from the landfill. Furthermore, finished compost ("black gold") can replace synthetic fertilizers and prevent the greenhouse gases associated with their production and transportation.

For a limited time, the Greater Victoria Compost Education Centre is pleased to offer subsidized compost bins and composting support to eligible community groups. Groups can join the Compost for our Climate and Community program for \$35. The program includes a workshop, access to subsidized composting supplies, materials for joining the Black Gold Rush Challenge, and follow-up composting support.





Issues in Global Warming

This spring, Victoria, Saanich, and Esquimalt participated in forums on climate change.

attended the Victoria meeting held on April 10 and found myself catapulted from the rather complacent notion I previously held, to a realization that the world community will likely face significant challenges due to global warming. We can no longer ignore the fact that this phenomenon is occurring, nor that much of it is directly related to human activity.

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change was established in 1988 by the U.N. and has just recently released Part 2 of its report, Impact, Adaptation and Vulnerability. What is clear from this ten year study is that change will continue to be a part of our lives.

Sea levels are already rising, and as that increases, land masses will be lost. Increased periods of precipitation and an increase in severe storms are predicted to follow. In between the heavier rains, we can expect increased droughts, crop failures, heat waves, and what is referred to as "abrupt climate changes" or surprises.

We can no longer wait to do something. We will have to adapt to these changes while also beginning the process of mitigation.

Without a doubt, we need to preserve our forests, conserve our fresh water, and protect our food sources. We also need to redirect our energy usage by changing our methods of transport, controlling development, and demanding efficient building practices.

Living as we do, between the beautiful mountains and sea, it is hard for us to think that we must look beyond the present moment. However, with such daunting evidence that global warming is occurring, it is hard not to think the time for action is now.
