





Report Graffiti ASAP

Graffiti has been popping up all over our neighbourhoods – on bus shelters, post boxes, garbage cans, telephone poles, BC Hydro transformer boxes and more. The majority of this graffiti is tagging, which because its nature, devalues our properties and demeans our community by making our spaces feel uncared for and even unsafe. As a community, each and every one of us can combat graffiti by reporting it as soon as a tag appears. The faster it is removed, the less likely it will continue. Who to contact to have the damage removed depends on what object was tagged. It is dealt with on a first come first served basis, so the sooner we contact the appropriate organization, the sooner it will be removed. The district of Saanich website has links to the different organizations responsible for their own property, simply type 'graffiti' into their search bar on their website to see the links.

By keeping the email addresses (or phone numbers) in your cellphone, reporting a new tag can be quick and simple; take a photo and email it and its location to the appropriate organization. Quick and easy! You can also call the organization and leave the information on their voice mail. The contact information is listed below. Eradicating graffiti as soon as it appears helps our community look cleaner and feel safer. Don't accept tagging as a 'normal' occurrence, help fight it by taking action right away. We each have a role to play in keeping our neighbourhoods safe, clean and family-friendly.

Controlling Invasive Plants in our Gardens

May was BC Invasive Species Action Month. If you garden, I expect you can attest to the work required when plants outgrow their welcome. On a wider scale, invasive plants and other species can negatively impact the province's environment, economy, and in some instances human health. Focusing on things with roots, what makes a plant invasive? Often invasive plants are thoses introduced from other regions but that arrive without whatever keeps them in check at home. Normally an ecosystem is delicately balanced, with feeding insects, grazing animals, or weather conditions keeping plant populations under control. Not all plants transported here from their natural range are a problem and they settle in without much concern. Other introduced plants, however, are too good at capturing water and soaking up nutrients and they spread aggressively via root and/or seed. Left to their own devices, these vigorous invaders can dominate an ecosystem, outcompeting and pushing out the plants local to an area. Think Scotch broom, Himalayan blackberry, or periwinkle. Other plants - like giant hogweed, poison hemlock, Dalmatian toadflax, spurge laurel and Lesser celandine - are to different degrees toxic to humans and/or animals. Walking in a local park the other day I saw slow growing common camas one one side of a narrow path and easily spreading Spanish bluebells on the other. Uh oh, I thought. We commonly see English ivy and daphne pushing out the native understory plants in parks everywhere. Many of these escape our gardens, transported by birds.

How can I check what's in my garden and make sure nothing is invasive? Search the web for the keywords invasive species and CRD to find a list of the species to watch out for. Two good brochures to start with are Invasive Plants in Your Garden (Habitat Acquisition Trust) and Grow Me Instead (Invasive Species Council of BC). These short handouts include suggestions for alternative non-invasive plants and instructions for removing invasive plants that we do find safely.

What could we plant that has a positive impact on the environment? To make our yards more pollinator friendly, we want to provide what Dr. Elisabeth Elle, a conservation biologist from SFU, calls non-invasive plants that offer "pollen on a plate". These are wide open flowers without too many intricate folds or with long tube-shaped flowers, where pollen and nectar is easily accessible to insects or hummingbirds. These can be introduced species, but better yet is including plant species native to this region. Alas it is often inadvertently at our nurseries that invasive species first become available, either in pots or in enticing packages of 'wildflower mixes' which often includes seeds from other regions that can become a problem. (Satinflower Nurseries, however, does offer seed mixes specifically for our area.) Dr. Elle has long recommended adding native plants to our yards to create an enticing array of pollen sources and much needed habitat, ideally making sure there are options available from early spring to late in the fall. Another resource to look for, <u>Gardening with Native Plants</u>, includes a list of native plants, the conditions they like, what is deer resistant, and what pollinating insects they attract. Definitely if you can, plant these instead!

SATURDAY, JULY 1, 2024 ROAD CLOSURE ADVISORY



On Monday July 1, 2024, the Gorge Tillicum Community Association is hosting the Gorge Canada Day Picnic to celebrate community and our beautiful neighbourhood. We again expect over 10,000 people to attend and stroll along Gorge Road itself and the Gorge Waterway paths.

An integral part of the day is the closure of Gorge Road West between Tillicum and Admirals. We applied for and received a Special Event Permit from the Municipality. This road closure is permitted by the Municipality of Saanich and the Saanich Police Department and coordinated with BC Transit. Here are the details of the road closure:

- **1.** Gorge Road West between Tillicum Road and Admirals Road will be closed to vehicle traffic from 7:30am to 5:00pm on July 1st. The bicycle lanes will be needed for the event and for pedestrians and therefore closed to bikes.
- 2. Vehicle access to/from Gorge Road West properties will be for emergency purposes only, and thus residents are advised to park their cars on the side streets on the evening of June 30th and all day on July 1st until 5pm if you need to leave the area. Access to and from all side streets will be by Vincent Ave, Cowper Ave, and Admirals Rd (for Rockwell & Inlet).
- **3.** All side streets will be blocked for the day at their intersection with Gorge Road West by a police vehicle or an unattended parked vehicle.
- **4.** The westbound lane of Gorge Road West is a designated emergency access route for police, fire, and paramedics. It MUST be kept free of obstacles for emergency vehicles if necessary. Please do not set up games, furniture, or anything at all on the road or public sidewalks.
- **5.** No residential parking is permitted in Gorge Road West parking lots/areas between 7:30am and 5:00pm on July 1st.
- **6.** All BC Transit bus service will re-route away from Gorge Road West during the closure.
