Over the course of the last decade, everybody in the neighbourhood was likely aware of Dave Armitage's presence. He was the quiet and mysterious bearded man who frequented Gorge Park and the Gorge Plaza, often seen crouched sunning himself outside Subway or sitting on his favourite bench outside the Shoppers' Drug Mart. He always wore a long black oilskin jacket and often, in recent months, a black fedora, Frank Sinatra style.

Dave never (not even once) asked folks for a handout but spent his public time quietly. He would give you a 'wink', sometimes say a friendly hello or hold a door open for you when your hands were full but otherwise he

was generally gentle and unassuming. As many of our readers will know, (because of the coverage in Saanich *News*, the *TC* and social media,) Dave died in Gorge Park on December 28, 2016.

Unlike many of the homeless, Dave came from an established and loving Victoria family, and so, in an article dated January 6, 2017, a Saanich News reporter was able to interview his nephew and gather the story of Dave's journey from husband and father of a beloved daughter to homeless man. According to Steve Migliarese, Armitage received a diagnosis of schizophrenia in 2001, stopped

taking his prescribed medication, and became somewhat estranged from his family. The tragedy of the situation was that Dave and his family needed a treatment program, but no such program was offered to him, and so Dave began his time of, as his nephew put it, "living in public spaces."

Dave's story caused both anger and sadness in many who eventually got to hear it, because it highlighted a governmental lack of commitment to supplying adequately funded alternatives for the homeless with mental health problems.



## a few words from the president

Where did the last year go? It seems like we just got going on 2016 and now we have to turn the page to 2017.

Unfortunately, 2017 has not turned out the way we had hoped so far. The discovery of David Armitage, after he died alone in Gorge Park on December 28th, was a sobering reminder to us about the more vulnerable in our community. And then on January 19th another body was found in Rudd Park. While these tragedies occurred for different reasons, they both expose the gaps in our community for supporting those in need. It is doubtful that ether of these individuals would have chosen to have their lives end in such a way. The GTCA will continue to advocate for the more vulnerable in our community, but our resources are limited, and we need to partner with others to do the work that is needed.

With any new year, we always look for the positive messages. It can be a very hard task when blasting, digging and general green space destruction is going on everyday at the McKenzie intersection. We had to hold the ministry and their contractor accountable when, in the first days of the project, they breached their own environmental standards. Next we began receiving complaints about construction noise continuing throughout the evening. When we have inquired about this, we have been told that while the volume of noise should be reduced once the final phase of blasting is completed later this spring, MoTI will be continuing to work at

night throughout this project in an attempt to mitigate traffic impacts during the day. And shortly after they began piling the dirt along the highway side of the park, a rather large homeless camp appeared on MoTI property, which moved across the Burnside exit, was claimed to be removed, but was still there two weeks later. The negative impacts are piling up.

Enough of the rather depressing happenings. Let's turn to something that may interest you and inform you about who and what the GTCA is. We are your community vehicle to get involved in almost any kind of community project, issue, or idea. We have an unusually large agenda for a Saanich community. For many of the things we get involved in, we are asked to do so by Saanich, property owners, neighbours, business owners, and other groups who are local advocates for things like park lands, our local watershed, and even community gardens. Anyone interested in any of the topics noted, we always have room for new voices. As a matter of fact, new voices are always needed to refresh our conversations.

As president of the GTCA, I am always pleased to participate in conversations around our community. It is those learning experiences that feed creativity and leads to things like the annual Gorge Canada Day Picnic. Conversations about traffic conflicts results in traffic calming and even new sidewalks. Last November

we held a transportation workshop with a presentation from BC Transit and a broad discussion about transportation issues in our neighbourhoods. As a result we now have a revitalized GTCA Transportation Committee with 14 community folks signing up.

The GTCA voice is strong because of the professional approach we take and the skills of the people who contribute. Every year at this time we reach out to the community to invite even more people to join us.

There are many things to do and involvement can range from helping out at one of our events to taking on a longer term projects such as helping to manage the Garden Committee or contributing to the conversation about transportation issues. The GTCA Board is renewed at our Annual General Meeting each year. We will be updating our bylaws and constitution at the AGM this year as well. You will need to be a member to vote on any resolutions, so please come and join us on April 3, 2017 at the Native Friendship Centre on Regina Avenue. Doors open at 6:30 and I hope to see you there.



Our new fish fence signage at the Colquitz River salmon counting fence is wonderful! The back side features a locked poster board, which will be really helpful for notifications and updates about the river.





But Dave's story was not just a tragedy and a call to political action. Those who were at his Memorial Service at Trinity Presbyterian Church on January 15 may have been surprised to hear his later homeless years described as years of freedom and happiness, as if he had found a way of living with his mental illness that worked for him.

And not only did it work for him, but it also seemed to provide a gift to many of the more than two hundred people who crowded into the service. It was a deeply touching affair, with so many familiar faces from the neighbourhood, his family and friends, all there to share grief at the loss of this special individual. And this grief was echoed in the countless numbers who placed flowers and other mementoes on his bench at the plaza along with five large poster sheets filled with scrawled messages:

"Never asked me for anything, only how my day was going. Kind and never forgotten." "It is comforting to know how much you were loved and that you touched the hearts of so many." "Dave, you were such a beautiful soul, and God will welcome you with open arms." "I wished I'd taken the time to get to know you better." "Dave, I'm gonna miss our chats before I started my shift. You brightened my days." "Hope you land a spring salmon up in Heaven." Particularly touching: a child's drawing of two angels holding hands ("me and you"). There were at least as many messages as there were people at the service. Messages from sisters, a brother, a niece, a friend for whom he was best man, as well as from people who knew him slightly but were still touched by his presence.

Gorge-Tillicum is not a community without an identity. The area's community association, community garden, shops, library, pub, parks and local coffee bar all contribute to the area's identity in their own ways.

But to those of us who saw the expression of grief and memorializing around Dave's bench, or went to the memorial service, it seemed as if the area's identity had suddenly become bigger or more important in a way we couldn't have imagined.

How could the death of a homeless man be the cause of this expansion of community identity? One possible answer can be found in a recently published book by Sebastian Junger called Tribe: On Homecoming and Belonging. Tribe points to an often noted but mysterious fact: that in catastrophic situations, like earthquakes, floods, bombings by enemy powers and so on, social distinctions disappear and people instinctively co-operate, until the authorities step in. Junger claims the reason is that we have an instinctive tribal identity that makes us work together with other members of the tribe. In everyday life, though, this identity is rarely evident because western societies emphasize individualism and offer services -- like the police, fire departments, legal system etc. - that make helping each other redundant.

Junger's book begins with the author hitchhiking outside Gillette, Wyoming, and a homeless man coming up to him with a sandwich and a packet of potato chips. Junger reflects: "For reasons I'll never know, that man in Gillette decided to treat me as a member of his tribe." Dave Armitage was outside the systems of individualism and protective services that keep most of us safe and distant from each other, and, as the Saanich News reporter put it, he "crossed countless social barriers in striking up friendships with individuals from a variety of walks of life living in and around the Gorge-Tillicum area." Like the man who lived in a broken-down car in Gillette, Dave Armitage invited us to be in his tribe. The wealth of tributes he received show us how moved so many people were by this invitation. Thanks Dave.

Through the leadership of Bev King of Shopper's Drug Mart and Brian Haut of the Gorge Plaza Liquor Store, and the tremendous generosity of the community, over \$2500 was raised to remember Dave with a commemorative park picnic table. The Gorge Tillicum Community Association board voted to donate an additional \$500 to bring the total to the required \$3000. Later this spring, one of the damaged picnic tables in Gorge Park (across from Fairway) will be replaced by a new table for all to enjoy. Thanks to all who donated and a HUGE thank you to Bev and Brian.

## New Park at 574 Walter Avenue

The property at the corner of Walter and Dysart was gifted to the District of Saanich, with the stipulation the land become a natural state park.

The small house which was on the property had been built in 1914 and was on the heritage registry list. However, owing to its decades of neglect, a consultant recommended demolition and Saanich applied to have the house removed from the Saanich Heritage Register. On October 13, 2015, the Heritage Foundation approved its removal.

In September of 2016, Saanich held several on site meetings with local residents. About 40 people attended these meetings and shared their concerns and visions for the park.

The plan for the park will include: Garry oak trees with camas, native shrub planting, passive meadow area, grassy open space, natural play elements with logs and boulders, and a seating area with Adirondack chairs.

Park completion is slated for late spring.
